Family of believers at St. Paul Lutheran—

This is a recent post on facebook that I found, and wanted to share it with all of you as we transition from the Christmas to Epiphany seasons:

St. Jerome loved Christmas. He had a great and enduring love for the baby Jesus. This is what he would often recite in his head during the Christmas season.

Oftentimes when I look to Bethlehem, my heart converses with the child Jesus. I say, 'Lord Jesus, You are freezing. You shiver. It is so hard and uncomfortable where You sleep, so that I may be blessed. How will I ever be able to repay?' Then I think I hear the child answering, 'I don't want anything, dear Jerome. Just wait. Difficult times await Me, in Gethsemane and on the Holy Cross.' Then I continue to speak, 'dear Christ child, I have to give You something. I'll give You all my money.' The child answers, 'the heavens and Earth are Mine. I don't need your money. Give it to the poor, and then I will receive it as if it were given to Me.' I continue, 'dear Christ child, I will gladly do that, but I still have to give You something, or my sorrow will kill me!' Then the child says, 'dear Jerome, since you are so generous, I will tell you what you can give to Me. Give Me your sins. Give Me your bad conscience and your perdition.' I answer, 'what will You do with them?' Christ answers me, 'I will take them upon My shoulders. They will be My glory in My kingdom. Isaiah prophesied that I would bear your sins and take them away.' I begin to weep, 'child, dear Christ child, You move my heart to tears. I thought You wanted something good of mine, and You only want to have the evil within me. Take away what is mine! Give me what is Yours, so I will be free from sin and certain of eternal life!'

And indeed, each of us could say the same. We all want to give something back for God, to get on His good side by a deed or action we have done, but Isaiah says how all our good deeds are like polluted garments (the original Hebrew is even more specific and repulsive.) Put your sins at the foot of the manger and watch as they get carried through to the foot of the cross. In the Epiphany season Jesus is revealed to be the light of the world, the one to break the darkness we all experience. The Christ child was born for you, so continue on the journey He makes with us, and for us.

Lutheran Women in Mission

For over 80 years, the LWML has focused on affirming each woman's relationship with Christ, encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in active mission ministries and to support global missions. Every female member of an LCMS congregation is an automatic member of the LWML. At St. Paul, we meet four times a year on the first Thursday of March, May, September, and November at 1:30 pm in the conference room. We have a very short business meeting to catch up on what's happening in LWML district and national programs. We then spend time in a Bible study designed for women and we usually have postage stamps to trim. These cancelled postage stamps are sold and the funds received are used to support the mission projects of the LWML. We also collect the postage paid stamps affixed to charitable requests. Bring us the whole envelope please. We also collect eyeglasses and eyeglass cases to be taken on mission trips to countries where they are matched to what the local residents need to improve their vision. Current mission projects of the Northern Illinois District LWML are:

- St. John, LaGrange Reaching Out for their VBS Program
- Lutheran Heritage Foundation

If you would like a "mite" box to take home, they will be available in the narthex. The Bible story of the widow's mite is the inspiration for our mite boxes, and we encourage you to share dollars, checks, and any loose change you may have. Thank you for your support!!

In addition to our support of these mission projects of the District and National LWML, we take a table collection at our meetings and welcome Thrivent Choice Dollars as well as the proceeds from an item or two at the Oktoberfest auction. These monies are then donated at Christmas time to four families with Lutheran Bible Translators, and this year we also gave money to Lutheran Church Charities Comfort Dog Ministry, MOST Ministries, and Phil's Friends. The total of these gifts was \$490. We are thankful we are blessed to be able to share in these ministries and share the blessings we have received.








SUNDAY SCHOOL
